Christmas Eve Offering Designations

Part of our Christmas Eve tradition is to celebrate God's gift to us through gifts to our neighbors: both local and global. This year, as the Outreach Team considered the many needs in our world, we were reminded of the majesty of God, made flesh in a tiny, vulnerable baby.

With this focus, the Outreach Team selected these projects to receive equal shares of the Christmas Eve offering.

The International Half will go to the DRC (Democratic Republic of the Congo), by way of David Radcliff's New Community Project, for help in training 50 midwives in the face of an on-going crisis in maternal/newborn care. Indeed, a woman dies in childbirth every 25 minutes in the DRC, according to the World Health Organization, and women's lifetime risk of dying in the birthing process is 1 in 24. Almost 5% of the country's newborns die at birth or immediately after.

A two month training for 50 women costs \$1,500; Practitioner's Kits containing disinfectant, gloves and other essentials are \$40 per midwife.

The Local Half of the offerings will go to the Parish Resource Center for Baby Kits. The Parish Resource Center has been working with Union Community Care, the medical provider for many low-income folks in Lancaster and Lebanon Counties. They have requested Baby Kits to provide new moms with essentials to start them out right. The Outreach Team has decided to contribute money to help them provide as many gifts as possible. The current need is 25 Kits per month with pending requests to expand the program to provide even more. When a new mother and baby are released from the hospital, they can be sent home with a diaper bag full of basics to get them started.

Thank you for your generosity as we anticipate together the birth of the Christ child.

Serving Our Young Neighbors

Mountville Elementary School (MES) has blessed our church over the past four years with multiple opportunities to serve local children and families in need. MCOB members and friends have fulfilled dozens of Christmas wishes and have consistently responded whenever our contacts at the school have requested clothing, gift cards (for food and gasoline), help with several utility bills, lunch accounts, etc. We anticipate another opportunity to serve neighbors in need as Mountville Elementary again prepares for its annual "Christmas Mitten" project.

Most recently, school counselor Madelyn Saunders and Hempfield SD social worker Aleda Risser asked that we supply underwear and socks for an 8 year-old boy. Two days later we received an email asking for clothing and shoes for three children whose family home was destroyed by fire. Our congregation's love and generosity has resulted in a fund designated for basic emergency needs of low-income MES families. Because this money is readily available, we were able to shop and deliver the needed clothing items to the school almost immediately. Update on our Afghan Friends

After arriving 5 months ago, our Afghan family of five has settled nicely into the Lancaster community thanks to Church World Service and also to the Mountville congregation's significant contributions of time, dollars, and miles driven. Life is very different here for these former language and literature professors! Dad continues with mostly full-time employment at Packaging Corporation of America off Fruitville Pike. Mom stays mostly at home taking care of her family, but aspires to teach again one day. She is looking for seamstress work that she can do from their home. The 5 year old is doing very well in kindergarten.

Recent support of the family has included transportation to many medical and dental appointments (including root canals!!), education about banking and bill-paying, English/cultural lessons, and driving lessons for Mom. Recently, we've purchased and installed a new washer/dryer in their home and upgraded their cell phones. Our church has embraced the family with open arms, and they in turn consistently have expressed their gratitude back to us.

As the family becomes more and more self-sufficient, our church's week-to-week involvement soon will no longer be necessary. We recognize, though, that the family faces ongoing challenges as they navigate the complexities of medical insurance, auto maintenance, and managing a high cost of living on limited income. And, as Afghan refugees, they remain in a legal limbo until Congress passes the Afghan Adjustment Act. In the meantime, we've begun searching for a low-cost immigration lawyer who will be essential in helping our family file for asylum. We look forward to standing by them in their efforts to overcome this crucial hurdle. Thank you for your faithful prayers and support! — Larry Booz and Nancy Hess for the Welcome Team

Now I cut the material for bags for the 300 school kits that we pack each August, and I pass that material on for someone else to sew!

The kit bags are still getting made, and blankets, hats and mittens, too, but some of us decided we'd like to start meeting again, since we've missed the fellowship so much. We are happy to invite you to join us each Wednesday at 1:00 p.m., in Room 106, starting on November 30.

If you knit or crochet, you can help make afghans, baby blankets, hats, mittens, etc. Those who sew can help make the kit bags. And those who don't do any of those, we have some ladies who are willing to teach you! Or just come and enjoy the fellowship! We welcome you to share in our circle of friends, to stitch or sew or share!!





The Congregational Forum was held on October 30 following a delicious meal of shepherd's pie served by Rick & Linda Weber and their team. Financial reports and an update on giving showed the generosity of the congregation heading into the final months of 2022. Calling people to serve in church leadership positions was also voted on. We looked at Shared Ministry Priorities which came out of discussions at Annual Conference. We approved the 2023 budget with a 3.5% increase over 2022. 

Cancellation notices will be posted no later than 8:00 a.m. If you are unable to access any of these methods, please call Pastor Angela Finet or Jerry Bushong. The decision is made after carefully considering the weather forecast and the condition of the roads in Mountville and our parking lot. It is our hope that all persons will give priority to their health and safety when making a decision about traveling to church activities and worship services when the weather and road conditions are not optimal. Every attempt will be made to provide an online alternative.
