Love Notes from Pastor Angela

God also testified to it by signs, wonders and various miracles, and by gifts of the Holy Spirit distributed according to his will. ~~ Hebrews 2:4

What's the deal with miracles? Do they still happen today? Or do we think about miracles simply as a tongue-in-cheek response to an unlikely event – "well, THAT would take a MIRACLE!"

The Gospel of John records seven miracles of Jesus, and says that they took place so that people would believe. In other Gospels, the act of believing – having faith – was needed PRIOR to a miracle.

Biblical miracles benefited the recipient – no doubt! – but also brought glory to God. Are there things we do today that meet that criteria – acts that benefit our neighbors <u>and</u> bring glory to God? Might those things be considered miracles? How do the miracles recorded in the Bible impact and influence the way we live our Christian lives two thousand+ years later?

These are the questions we will explore during worship as we begin a new year. From January 8 through February 5, we will celebrate various healings, the feeding of the 5000+ and the raising of Lazarus as recorded in the Gospels. Guided by the recent book by Amy-Jill Levine, *Signs and Wonders*, we will consider "what is ours to do" as we participate in God's modern miracles.

As part of this sermon series, you will get to hear from Jim Grossnickle-Batterton, pastor of the Lititz Church of the Brethren, on January 15 as we participate in a "pastor swap." Start the new year inspired to be on the lookout for God's Spirit on the loose in the world!

Did You Know that Brethren Housing Association (BHA) which we support was recently celebrated? Nominated by a long time Adopt An Apartment supporter, BHA was grateful and honored to be recognized as one of the cutting edge non profit organizations that raises awareness of homelessness and affordable housing issues and provides peace and justice services for those who all too often experience discrimination and inequality. For this reason, BHA is now purchasing properties for "Affordable Housing initiative" to offer graduates of their program an opportunity to rent to own at an affordable rate not exceeding more than 30% of a family's income. Owning a home is one of the most significant ways to transfer wealth. BHA is making a significant change in the lives of families by being a guiding light and offering loving support in breaking systemic and generational life patterns.

Health Ministry Corner Holiday and Winter Gatherings

Medical experts remind us that the flu and COVID-19 are still around and can cause serious illness in children and vulnerable people. As we gather together during the winter months, there are measures we can take to stay healthy.



- ~Stay up to date on your flu and COVID vaccinations and boosters! According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, this is still the best way to protect yourself and others.
- ~If you or those around you are at risk for severe illness, wear a mask.
- ~Wash your hands thoroughly for 20 seconds when arriving at and leaving any social gatherings. Keep antibacterial hand sanitizer with you in case you are not able to wash your hands with soap and water.
- ~If possible, gather outside, since COVID-19 and other germs spread more easily indoors, according to the CDC. If you must host an indoor gathering, open windows an inch or two to bring in fresh air, which can prevent germs from accumulating. Also, if you have a central heating/cooling system, setting the fan to the "on" position instead of "auto" will keep the fan running and can reduce the risk of virus transmission.
- ~If you have any symptoms (sore throat, cough, runny nose, fever, headache) of COVID-19, the flu, or upper respiratory illness, you should stay home until you feel better, and test to see if you have COVID. As always, contact your Health Care Provider with any concerns.

Children's Worship - 14 Years

When children enter the sanctuary every Sunday we try to be quiet, but we do hope that you notice us. There are sometimes two and sometimes seven or nine but each Sunday a leader and helper are ready to worship with the children in their special sacred space downstairs. Every week we bless and thank God for each child. We pray for the people "upstairs". (We can sometimes hear them singing.) We pray for the children who are not there and end our pray by repeating The Lord's Prayer.

The "sermon" is a well told Bible story using a story box holding figures and other items to make the story concrete. The story is followed by "wondering questions". After worship the group spends time around the table sharing food and caring conversation.

Visitors are welcome. Follow us downstairs some Sunday and find a chair behind the circle. Observers are often moved and inspired by the children's response to the story or by the sharing of prayer requests.

- 2. Facebook notice
- 3. Church email
- 4. A phone call IF and only if you have requested a personal call.

If you would like a call if worship is cancelled and have not yet contacted our church office, please do so today.

Cancellation notices will be posted no later than 8:00 a.m. If you are unable to access any of these methods, please call Pastor Angela Finet or Jerry Bushong. The decision is made after carefully considering the weather forecast and the condition of the roads in Mountville and our parking lot. It is our hope that all persons will give priority to their health and safety when making a decision about traveling to church activities and worship services when the weather and road conditions are not optimal. Every attempt will be made to provide an online alternative.


