Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be pleasing to you, LORD, my rock and my redeemer.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year is also Valentine's Day! It seems fitting, then, that our theme for Lent is: "It's a heart thing!" During the 40 days of Lent, we will examine "the meditations of our hearts" to ensure they beat as one with Christ's.

Each Sunday, we'll consider a different attribute that lies at the *heart* of discipleship: humility, commitment, purpose, graciousness, love, obedience, and joy. We'll consider if, as followers of Jesus, our thoughts, words, and actions reflect the love of Christ – because after all, out of the heart, the mouth speaks (Matthew 12:34).

Lent is traditionally a time of giving something up, so this season, be encouraged to let go of the past, of guilt, and of the things that weigh you down, and cling tightly to Christ, the lover of your soul (Song of Solomon 6:3).



A Short Explanation of Our Outreach Budget Recipients

Stitch Sew and Share - A Fabric Arts Ministry called Stitch, Sew, and Share is a group that gets together once a week to make several different items such as: mittens, gloves, hats, NICU blankets, prayer shawls, and lap robes. They also assemble: Hygiene kits, School kits, Clean-up buckets, etc. Prayer shawls, blankets and lap robes are usually given to members first who are ill or have a new baby. The other items are distributed to designated areas where they are needed.

New Community Project - David Radcliff, who is the Director, and an Advisory Board decide which project receives the funds we send, unless we designate. NCP is a small non/profit organization with a big goal to change the world. Their focus is environmental sustainability and social justice, both of which are essential for a peaceful human community. NCP welcomes and works with anyone who shares their commitment to a world of peace, justice, and sustainability. NCP works with grass root groups in East and Southern Africa, Nepal, and Myanmar, in South Asia, the Dominican Republic, and native communities in the Ecuadorian Amazon, Alaska, and the Dine Reservation in New Mexico.

Publicity - This fund is used to help us be "Jesus in the Neighborhood" and to publicize MCOB. Some examples of items covered: Christmas Eve banner, Community Prayer Box, bookmarks, church brochure, chip clips, and any other publicity items.

Brethren Housing Association - This is a Social Services organization in Harrisburg, PA in the Allison Hills area. Their mission is to help individuals and families, (mostly single mothers) who are experiencing homelessness, achieve their God given potential by providing a holistic program of stable housing supportive services and loving relationships. We are notified when they need our help for the Adopt-an-Apartment project, and we respond with donations. We often help to clean and paint and help move in furniture. Our budgeted funds are used where needed.

God loves you and so do I - Reflections and a Challenge

Hopefully, many of you will recall Pastor Angela's sermon when she challenged us to greet strangers with the phrase "God loves you and so do I". It struck me as an interesting idea and I have been practicing it since then with some remarkable responses — not one of them negative. Well, that's not exactly correct — two had the potential to be negative but guess what — they turned out positively.

I'd like to share several encounters with you and suggest that even though Lent is quite a bit away, you might give this practice a try – doing something proactive rather than trying to give up chocolate for 40 days.

As many of you know I had my share of hospital experiences in 2023 and during those stays, I have to admit, I was terribly down about being away from my home, my dear wife Janice and our cat, Penny. It was a struggle to be positive but I remembered Pastor Angela's suggestion of brightening someone else's day by telling them "God loves you and so do I."


I recall one night when a young man came into my room to check my vitals and after he completed his tasks I thanked him and said "God loves you" He thanked me and left. Several hours later he came in again and asked if he could speak with me. He asked me if I was a Christian and explained that he was a lapsed church goer. He wanted to know if I believed in heaven and I said I trust that my loved ones will greet me there someday. Then, with tears in his eyes, he asked if I thought his beloved dogs would go there, too. How do you answer this? It meant so much to him. I said "yes, I do" and I do. There was a look of relief on his face as he turned to leave. Before he closed the door he said to me "Thank you" and "God loves you and so do I." I'm hoping he passes it forward.

On Christmas Eve I was particularly sad about being alone after Janice and her son, Brian had visited. A young nurse came in looking very weary and I asked her if she was okay. She said that after her shift ended at midnight she would be driving four hours to be with her sister on Christmas. I asked her to let me pray for her safe travel ending our prayer with "God loves you and so do I." She smiled and said goodbye and I didn't expect to see her again. Still awake at 11:50, there was a knock on my door. It was the nurse who stopped to say thank you, goodbye and to me "God loves you and so do I."

On Christmas Day, late in the afternoon, I was really homesick and I wanted to go home but couldn't. A heart doctor (Dr. X) who I had seen before and didn't particularly care for because of his condescending attitude, came in and asked why I was upset. When I told him he essentially said "too bad" and proceeded to leave. As he exited I muttered, half reluctantly, "God loves you and so do I." No response. However, the next morning as I was getting ready for a heart catheterization, a heart group nurse came in to check my vitals. Afterwards, she said, "By the way, Dr. X wanted me to tell you that he is sorry for the way he treated you last night." I was moved.

And finally, on our way back from NOAC last Fall, we stopped at a fast food restaurant for lunch. On our way out I noticed a rather large and burly man, dressed in work clothes, approaching us. He looked as if he was upset and I felt a "God loves you and so do I" would be appropriate. As I finished saying it, he clenched his fist, raised it, and I was sure I might be in trouble. Much to my surprise, he wanted to fist bump me, and said "Back atcha my brother." Go figure?

I would encourage you, my fellow MCOBers, to give it a try. You never know how this simple phrase might make someone's day a bit brighter. Here's hoping you might get a "back atcha."

- 10. they need help. (be available.)
- 11. their God-given vision is bigger than themselves and the church. (be faith-filled.)
- 12. they want to personally meet all the needs, but know they can't. (be understanding.)
- 13. they are going to say some dumb things every now and then. (be forgiving.)
- 14. they are greatly encouraged by your faithfulness. (be there.)
- 15. they are passionate for God's word to be made practical to you. (be hungry.)
- 16. they long for church to be your spiritual oasis. (be loving.)
- 17. they dream for you and your family's spiritual health. (be receptive.)
- 18. they need to hear that you pray for them. (be interceding.)
- 19. they are just regular people. (be real.)

- 3. Church email
- 4. A phone call IF and only if you have requested a personal call.

If you would like a call if worship is cancelled and have not yet contacted our church office, please do so today.

Cancellation notices will be posted no later than 8:00 a.m. If you are unable to access any of these methods, please call Jerry Bushong or Barry Lauver. The decision is made after carefully considering the weather forecast and the condition of the roads in Mountville and our parking lot. It is our hope that all persons will give priority to their health and safety when making a decision about traveling to church activities and worship services when the weather and road conditions are not optimal. If worship is cancelled, watch for an email about an online alternative at a later time.
