## Love Notes from Pastor Angela

Take a fresh breath and let God renew your attitude and spirit. ~~ Ephesians 4:23, The Voice ~~

As we begin 2025, instead of celebrating a New Year, let's celebrate a *Renew Year*!

On January 21, 1525, a small group of Christians secretly gathered in Zurich, Switzerland, for a worship service. They renounced their baptism as infants and chose to be rebaptized as adults, believing that this decision led a transformation of life in the way of Jesus. For many, this decision led to imprisonment, torture, and even death.

But this gathering also marked the beginning of the Anabaptist movement that continues today in more than 80 countries around the world in the form of the Brethren, Mennonites, Amish, Hutterites, and many other related groups.

In January, to commemorate the five hundredth anniversary of the Anabaptist movement, our worship services will invite personal and congregational spiritual renewal. We will look back, even as we strive to live wholeheartedly into God's future.

As part of worship, we will seek a renewed groundedness in our community's sacred stories (a groundedness that includes honest repentance and humility about our failures), a renewed trust in yielding ourselves to seek and do God's will, and a renewed sense of joy and celebration as siblings around Jesus' table – through the celebration of communion on Sunday, January 26.

It is my prayer that this time of renewal will foster great growth – for you personally, and for your relationships with one another and with God. And that sounds like a great start for a new (and renewed) year!

### New Library Books for Young and Not So Young

Cozy in this winter with a book! We continue to add new titles to our library collection. You can find them in the lower narthex and check them out yourself!

For children, we have new titles by Rachel Held Evans, Amy-Jill Levine, Sonia Sotomayor, and others on topics like learning to respect one another even though each one has different abilities, the difficulties and rewards of making new friends, a fresh look at the parable of the fig tree, and perhaps the ultimate question - What is God like? These books are sure to inspire some great conversation as you share them together.


For adults, we have 3 new titles. In *An Untidy Faith: Journeying Back to the Joy of Following Jesus*, Kate Boyd takes a fresh look at what it means to be a follower of Jesus in the midst of culture wars, scandals, and other abuses of the institutional church, by asking and answering the questions many of us have wanted answers to but were afraid to ask. Boyd has a remarkable story, and this book includes personal stories of her own faith journey. This book will help you grow in your faith and encourage us all to build community that looks ever more like Jesus.

The blurb on the back of Timothy J. Geddert's book *The Beginning of the Story: Understanding the Old Testament in the Story of Scripture*, says: "Although the Bible contains 66 books that usually span over 1000 printed pages, most Christians turn first - and sometimes only - to the New Testament." We don't know what to do the the Old Testament, except for a few well known stories and the occasional Psalm for our personal devotions. "But to understand the Bible as the grand story that it is - the story of God's dealings with humanity, and relationship to the whole universe - we must learn to read the first 3/4 of scripture as Jesus did, and as the New Testament teaches us to do." Sound helpful? Check it out!

In *Godbreathed: What it Really Means for the Bible to be Divinely Inspired*, author Zack Hunt confronts the many ways the Bible has been used as a weapon - a means to divide, marginalize, and conquer. How do we work with the texts that have been used in this manner? Where do we find the love contained therein? Hunt's writing is down-to-earth, and his book invites us to read the Bible anew - as an invitation into a new way of living and loving on earth as it is in heaven.

And, finally, if cold weather inspires warm cooking, then check out the *New Plains People's Cookbook*, filled with recipes from the Western Plains District Church of the Brethren. Yum!

#### **Deadlines**

#### Church Key Fobs

#### Room Reservations

If you would like to reserve the sanctuary, fellowship hall, kitchen or a class room for an event or a meeting, **please call or email the church office** to see if your date and room are available. Jackie will then give you a *Building Use Form* to fill out and return to the church office. Thank you for helping to keep the church calendar accurate.

#### Church Table and Chair Loan Policy

Church members are allowed to borrow a maximum of 4 tables and chairs as needed. They are to be returned a.s.a.p. or within 4 days after pick-up. We ask that the tables be cleaned before returning and notify Jackie if there is any damage. Please call the church office to check on availability and to reserve the tables / chairs you need.

#### Flowers for the Worship Center

If you would like to place flowers in the worship center in memory or in honor of someone, please see the flower chart located in the hallway by the kitchen. There you may sign up for your special date and write what you would like put in the bulletin and if you would like an arrangement: \$43 or 2 vases: \$48. Orders are placed monthly with Schaefer's Flowers about 1 week prior to the upcoming month. Fill out a pink form by the flower chart and return with payment to the church office or offering plate. You may call Schaefer's directly to place a special request. You may also choose a different florist. Please contact the church office if you plan to use a different florist so you won't be billed twice. Thank you.

#### Placing Items in the Refrigerator / Freezer

When placing items in the refrigerator or freezer please put your name and date on a label and attach it to each item of food and/or drink. Labels are located on both the freezer and refrigerator doors. This will help keep your items from being taken accidently and will help us know who to contact if there are any questions about the food.



#### Winter Weather Cancellation Policy

- 4. A phone call IF and only if you have requested a personal call.

If you would like a call if worship is cancelled and have not yet contacted our church office, please do so today.

Cancellation notices will be posted no later than 8:00 a.m. If you are unable to access any of these methods, please call Jerry Bushong or Barry Lauver. The decision is made after carefully considering the weather forecast and the condition of the roads in Mountville and our parking lot. It is our hope that all persons will give priority to their health and safety when making a decision about traveling to church activities and worship services when the weather and road conditions are not optimal. If worship is cancelled, watch for an email about an online alternative at a later time.
