Glimpses from the Past

Anabaptist Beginnings

With Pastor's Angela's permission and use of her sermon from January 5, 2025, let's review some important facts about the Anabaptist movement.

During the Reformation, Ulrich Zwingli began preaching at the Grossmunster church in Zurich, Switzerland about reforming various Catholic traditions. By challenging the practice of infant baptism, he agreed with other reformers that baptism be a believer's choice, made when a person is of an age to make a choice to follow the teachings of Scripture. Zwingli found others who wanted to see reform in the church. They wanted to see a church more in agreement with what they were reading in the New Testament. These people gathered to read Scripture, study and share ideas. This began in 1522, only five years after Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the door of a church with critiques of the Roman Catholic Church.

On January 21, 1525, a group of these radical reformers met at a home near the Grossmunster church. They read the Bible and prayed together. They concluded that the baptism they had received as infants was no baptism at all! After praying, one of them asked another to baptize him. He then baptized the others who were present and Anabaptism was born.

This story was repeated in 1708 in Schwarzenau, Germany by Alexander Mack and the seven others who laid the foundation for the Church of the Brethren.

Anabaptism (meaning rebaptism) was an act of sedition. This was a label given to the group, but they didn't think they were being *rebaptized*, since they felt that the baptism received at birth was not a baptism at all. Needless to say, the Anabaptists were persecuted for their beliefs. For example, in 1527, Felix Manz whose feet and hands were bound before he was "rebaptized" (drowned) in the Limmat River.

In 1525, the Anabaptist movement spread into the Netherlands being heard by Menno Simons, a Catholic priest. Menno began teaching and preaching Anabaptist values and became influential in the spread of the movement. The label Mennonites was assigned to the people who subscribed to the teachings of Menno, but it was not chosen by them.

I Corinthians 3:11 expresses the sentiment of the early Anabaptist movement. No one - not the emperor, not the pope - can lay a faith foundation other than the one already laid by Christ. We focus on seeking the mind of Christ by gathering around Scripture which is a fundamental aspect of our Anabaptist tradition.

A summary of what it means to be Anabaptist from Palmer Becker's book <u>Anabaptist</u> Essentials: Jesus is the center of our faith, Community is the center of our life, and Reconciliation is the center of our work. Doesn't this sound like our Core Values? We are the descendants of this faith tradition - the ones charged with breathing new life into Christ's peaceful and active movement in our world today. Let us continue in this endeavor in 2025 and beyond.



Winter Weather Cancellation Policy

In the event that bad weather requires us to cancel church activities or worship services, these are the ways you will be notified:

- 1. Mountville Church of the Brethren website
- 2. Facebook notice
- 3. Church email
- 4. A phone call IF and only if you have requested a personal call.

If you would like a call if worship is cancelled and have not yet contacted our church office, please do so today.

Cancellation notices will be posted no later than 8:00 a.m. If you are unable to access any of these methods, please call Jerry Bushong or Barry Lauver. The decision is made after carefully considering the weather forecast and the condition of the roads in Mountville and our parking lot. It is our hope that all persons will give priority to their health and safety when making a decision about traveling to church activities and worship services when the weather and road conditions are not optimal. If worship is cancelled, watch for an email about an online alternative at a later time.
