Love Notes from Pastor Angela

Then Jesus said, "The Sabbath was created for humans; humans weren't created for the Sabbath. ~~ Mark 2:27

In May of 2024, I received an invitation to write a Bible study for Brethren Press on the topic of Sabbath. The seven months following that invitation completely changed my understanding of Sabbath and its importance to a life of Shalom that God intends for each of us.

In researching and writing about this topic, I have adopted new habits and practices that have strengthened my faith, improved my health, and deepened my awareness of the inequity of Sabbath opportunities in our culture, and the violence and harm that causes.

I am eager to share what I have learned with you, and to gather together to discuss it. We will be using this book for a small group study beginning *Thursday*, *September 11 at 1 pm*, and continuing on Thursday afternoons for the next several weeks.

The books are \$11.99 plus tax and shipping. However, if we pre-order as a group, we save 20% and lower the shipping costs. For those for whom this creates a financial burden, free copies will be available.



Books will begin shipping at the end of May, and we will calculate the actual cost of shipping and notify you then to collect your book and make payment.

God's Eternal Word

Just prior to COVID, MCoB member Sarah E. received a call from the Thrift Store at Brethren Village, where she lives. They had received a donation and they thought she might want to see it. She was mystified, because while she occasionally bought jewelry there, she didn't think a new piece of jewelry would necessitate a personal invitation to shop!

Upon arrival at the Thrift Shop, a black bag was presented to her. Inside the bag was a Bible. When she opened the Bible, it became clear that the Bible had been given to her by the Mountville Church of the Brethren in 1953. What was more remarkable, the handwriting was her father's - Rev. Harry E.


Sarah had no recollection of receiving the Bible, but when she shared the story with Marian Br, Marian told her that the Sunday School Primary Class had all received Bibles after their baptism at the Lancaster Church of the Brethren's old building. (The picture is of Sarah at that age).

Sarah doesn't remember that event, but she believes the Bible ended up in her father's home office...and Sarah didn't touch the books in her father's home office. Over the many years, the books were all boxed up and ultimately sold by the box at an estate sale. An unknown person bought the box the Bible was in....and then somehow the box ended up in a storage room in another woman's home in Lititz. She turned it into the Thrift Store because someone had mentioned to her that a Sarah Enders resided there.

More than 70 years later, the book found its way back to its original owner! When Sarah received it, it was in pristine condition. But the lockdowns that occured during COVID afforded Sarah with uninterrupted hours to read her Bible...to the point where the spine and cover had to be reattached with binding tape.

God certainly moves in mysterious ways!



Surplus Allocation Update

At our semi-annual Congregational Forum on February 23, the congregation voted to spend the \$71,740.91 2024 budget surplus in the following manner: 30% to the Endowment Fund (our savings account); 20% to Outreach Ministry Team to include gifts to Power Packs, COBYS, and Church World Service; 15% to the Deacon Emergency Fund to help those in need; 15% to the Building Maintenance Fund; 10% for technology upgrades; 5% to the Education Ministry Team for upgrades to the Children's Wing; and 5% for a new ministry based upon our Core Values. We are in awe of the generosity of this congregation which makes all these important expenditures possible.

New to the Library!



We continue to add <u>new</u> reading material to our church library, located in the lower narthex. And now, books of interest are easier to find! We have categorized the books by topic, including: Bible Study, Devotionals, Peace and Justice, Building Community, Christian Living, Brethren History/Theology, Biographies, and Christian Fiction. This month's new book is by the Episcopal Bishop of Washington, Mariann Edgar Budde.

Bishop Budde reminds us that being brave is not a singular occurrence; it's a journey that we can choose to undertake every day.

Sabbatical Team Update

Pastor Angela will be away from the church from May 24 - July 6.

May 24 - June 2 will be her Continuing Education work.

June 3 - 29 will be her Sabbath Renewal time.

June 30 - July 6 will be her attendance at Annual Conference.

Why is Sabbath Rest important for Pastors?

A pastor who has a periodic opportunity to step away from day-to-day ministry for spiritual renewal, to strengthen their own faith, and to develop new skills and a broader perspective is likely to have a longer term of service and to serve with greater levels of passion and creativity in their mission. After the pastor returns, the congregation enjoys improved pastoral leadership. The church is more likely to retain the services of a pastor who has greater satisfaction in their ministry, which a period of sabbath rest is uniquely able to support. A sabbath rest leave is an investment on the part of the church in building and sustaining the future of ministry for the pastor, the congregation, and the broader church.

The Leadership Team has been working on this and planning for this for the last 18 months. There is money in the budget for pastoral coverage. A Sabbatical team has been formed with Nanette Bushong, Cathy Funderwhite, and Jerry Bushong. They have been meeting to define the pastoral responsibilities that need to be covered. As the meetings progressed, an idea of splitting the responsibilities between more than one individual came to the forefront. A meeting with Pastor Angela was held to make sure all responsibilities were covered.

There are 2 candidates that the Sabbatical team will be meeting with to offer a ministry agreement. More details will be forthcoming in the bulletin and newsletter.

Steward Ministry Team: SANCTUARY

You may have noticed the shortened pew in the sanctuary. This work was recently completed to provide wheelchair access and promote inclusion.

<u>Short term changes</u>: More changes are in the works! This includes shortening another pew directly across from the one already modified to provide additional access to those with mobility issues. Handrails will be added at the steps at the front of the sanctuary, one on each side, and one in the middle. Again, the intent is to provide better access and safety for those who need to navigate these steps. Finally, the organ will be raised out of the pit it is currently located in and placed on a newly constructed platform at the same level as adjacent area.

Long term changes: Additional changes in the foreseeable future are also being considered. We will soon be soliciting the assistance of an architectural firm to assist in the review of current sanctuary condition and provide several possible options for modifications. Changes reviewed and considered will be intended to provide better access and safety to ALL areas of our worship area. The focus of any and all changes considered will also include appearance, functionality, safety, egress, future technology infrastructure, compliance with current codes and insurance requirements.

Look for the congregational questionnaire later this month. This will allow all members to have input and share any thoughts, concerns and ideas.

Also, I will keep all of you posted on status and progress of this project each month. So read your newsletter!
