On Sunday, May 4, we will celebrate World Labyrinth Day – a day we are encouraged to make a *pilgrimage* that promotes peace and wholeness: God's Shalom. Labyrinths have been used for meditation and prayer for more than 5000 years. They may, at first glance, look like a maze, but there is only one way in, and one way out. The path, with its gentle twists and turns, mirrors our journey toward, and with, God.

Our worship service will prepare us for this journey. Then, you are invited to stay after worship and walk the large canvas labyrinth that will be available in our fellowship hall (we will also have finger labyrinths for those who prefer that method of meditation). We will provide centering words and journaling pages so that you can reflect on your experience.

We have invited our siblings in Christ from the other Mountville churches to drop in after their worship services to partake of this spiritual discipline as well. And you are certainly welcome to invite your friends! The labyrinth will be available anytime between 11:30 am and 1:30 pm (so you could go and have lunch and them come back, if you choose).



Sabbath, Sabbatical, and Pastor Angela

Sabbath and Sabbatical share the root of the Hebrew word Shabbat, meaning "rest." Sabbatical is an extended period of leave for prayer, study, travel, and spiritual growth. It is derived from the biblical concept of the Sabbath.

Beginning May 24 through July 6, Pastor Angela will be away from the church. This period will comprise a period of Continuing Education, (May 24—June 2), Sabbatical time (June 3—June 29), and Annual Conference Attendance (June 30—July 6). The Leadership Team has prepared for this time of Pastor Angela's absence for the last 18 months. A Sabbatical planning committee is working to insure all the pastoral, administrative and financial needs of the church are met.

This time of scripturally based renewal for pastors is an investment on the part of the church in sustaining the future of ministry for the pastor, the congregation and the broader church. A pastor who has a periodic opportunity to step away from day-to-day ministry for spiritual renewal, to strengthen their own faith, and to develop new skills and a broader perspective is likely to have a longer term of service and to serve with greater levels of passion and creativity in their mission.



Since Pastor Angela will not be receiving emails, texts, or phone calls during this time, a congregational letter will be sent shortly providing contact information for two individuals who will be our coverage for pastoral, pulpit supply, and visitations. Information for other administrative details of our church life will also be included. This is an exciting opportunity for embracing God's gift of Sabbath, the gift of rest, reflection, and renewal.

New Additions to the Church Library!

We continue to add new titles to our library offerings that reflect our Core Values. Each of this month's new books were authored by women! If you haven't visited our library in the lower narthex recently (or ever), please come on down! There is something for everyone!

For our young readers, we have added the classic book by Madeleine L'Engle, *A Wrinkle in Time.* The book is the hope-filled story about the triumph of light and love over darkness, as seen through the experiences of one little girl. Also check out *Walk in Peace.* This is a wonderful bedtime read, with the refrain "God loves you, sweet child. Walk in peace," serving as a beautiful prayer and benediction for a busy day.

New books for adults cover a wide range of topics. *Relentless Goodbye: Grief and Love in the Shadow of Dementia* is one woman's story of her journey alongside her husband as he slowly slips away. This beautifully written memoir offers encouragement and the reminder that we are never alone.

Dear White Peacemakers is a love letter to the beloved community, and an invitation to be about the holy work of anti-racism. This book draws heavily on the Sermon on the Mount, and helps us to look at our own efforts to seek God's shalom and healing in our racially torn world. Our emerging theme from our Core Values work is the practice of peace and justice. But *What Does Justice Look Like?* This small book gets at the heart of what Jesus has to say about it. This book would make an excellent personal devotional. Grab a journal and see what God calls forth in you!

With so much in the news surrounding immigration, it is good to be reminded of Jesus' command to "welcome the stranger." *Love Undocumented: Risking Trust in a Fearful World* explains the situations facing today's immigrants as they navigate the U.S. immigration system. As we learn more, we will fear less - allowing us to live out Christ's command faithfully.



Glimpses from the Past

C.L.I.M.B.

How would your child feel if he/she came home to an empty house after school? How would you feel? In 1987, Mountville COB

y COB

saw a need in the number of children that were alone after school and set about to fill it. We joined with the other churches from the Mountville Ministerium (Trinity United Church of Christ, Mountville Mennonite Church, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, and Concordia Lutheran Church) and developed a "latchkey" program.

Many things needed to be done in order to get this project under way. It was aptly named C.L.I.M.B. (Caring and Learning in Mountville Boro). A board of directors was chosen with members from each of the participating churches and the president of Mountville Elementary School's Parent Teacher Organization. The board hired Kitty Collier, a certified teacher and member of Mountville Church of the Brethren, as its part-time director. Kitty, along with the board, began to work on funding and obtaining a state license. Projected first year costs to care for 45 children was \$24,186. Budget items included salaries for a part-time program director, two part-time group leaders and two part-time aides as well as utilities, equipment and supplies.

Income would come from the \$5 per child registration fee plus the \$1-per-hour care fee. Low income families and families with more than one child would pay lower fees. In order to make up the deficit, grants were received from the Mountville Welfare Association and Central Intermediate Unit, a state agency that provided start-up grants and training for latchkey programs in central Pennsylvania. St. Paul's United Methodist Church offered a \$10,000 interest free loan, if needed.

Rev. Allen T. Hansell (pastor of Mountville COB 1985-1989) indicated that the monetary backing is a "symbol saying that this community stands together. Not only is there a unified ministerium, but the community itself sees this need and is responding to it."

Seven classrooms and the fellowship hall were available for use. Snacks were served in the open area of the basement. There were classrooms set aside for quiet activities such as homework. Kickball and softball could be played at the park next to the church. Crafts and games would also be available. The program's format was informal, depending on the interests of the children. Kitty hoped that members of the ministerium would volunteer to work at C.L.I.M.B., possibly providing tutoring for homework or supervising children who will practice musical instruments.

The program was in existence for two years with approximately 24 children in attendance each year. The YWCA was so impressed by the success of the program that it transitioned C.L.I.M.B. into additional elementary schools and our program was absorbed into the Hempfield group.


